## Notice of the Deposit of Instrument of Accession to the 1992 Fund Protocol by the Philippines and Uruguay

In accordance with Regulation 4.6 of the Internal Regulations of the International Oil Pollution Compensation Fund 1992 (1992 Fund), the Director has the honour to notify Contracting States that instruments of accession to the Protocol of 1992 to amend the International Convention on the Establishment of an International Fund for Compensation for Oil Pollution Damage, 1971 (1992 Fund Protocol), were deposited by the Philippines and Uruguay on 7 July 1997 and 9 July 1997, respectively. The 1992 Fund Protocol will enter into force for the Philippines and Uruguay on 7 July 1998 and 9 July 1998, respectively.

The 26 States which have deposited instruments of ratification, acceptance, approval or accession in respect of the 1992 Fund Protocol are listed overleaf.
